

Provide frequent feedback about their performance




Integrate, synthesize and apply knowledge in deeper, more meaningful ways







Nature of Science (NOS) Instruction






With and Without HIPs



23.1% of undergraduate females and 5.4% of undergraduate males experience rape or sexual assault (RAINN).

A woman is physically abused every nine seconds in our country (NCADV).

99% of perpetrators of sexual violence will walk free (RAINN).

1 in 4 girls feel uncomfortable using school bathrooms (U.N. Women).

Only 20% of female student victims, age 18-24, report to police (RAINN).




